

Security work begins

Students at College Lane, Coronado and Stone Elementary will be greeted with a new entrance after their two-week holiday vaca-

Entrances at the schools are being renovated for security purposes.

Instead of doors that lead directly into the hallways, entrances will lead to a lobby area that leads to the school office.

The renovations, which in total will cost about \$2 million, began Friday at Coronado Elementary as soon as students and staff left the campus for the holiday break.

The project is part of the \$25 million general obligation bond election passed in September, which includes the construction of a new elementary school and a new Broadmoor Elementary.

"Stone and College Lane are relatively simple to do," said Hobbs Schools Director of Operations Gene Strickland. "It is literally an installation of another storefront at the corner of the hallway where their office is. They are going to be mirrors of each other."

Secondary doorways at both schools will be removed.

"That (the second doorway) is coming out," Strickland said. "It's in the way and it stays open 100 percent of the time. It's more of a bottleneck, so that's going to come out completely."

Two storefronts will be installed at Sanger Elementary due to the "nature" of the building and the office location, Strickland said.

"Sanger is on the list because we feel comfortable that we can get part of it done during Christmas break," he added.

Investigation of cemetery murder continuing

Investigation continues in the body found at Prairie Heaven cemetery

"The body was sent to Albuquerque autopsy." Hobbs Police Department Public Information Officer Mike Stone said. "The investigation is still continuing."

The body of 42-year-old Eddie White of Hobbs was found at Prairie Haven Cemetery Thursday Morning. HPD is investigating the case as a homicide.

According to a press release from the Hobbs Police Department, officers responded to Prairie Haven Memorial Park Cemetery in reference to an unresponsive subject.

White was pronounced dead at the

The cemetery was closed to the public for much of the day but reopened to the public Thursday afternoon, Parks and Recreation Superintendent Wade Whitehead.

"At about four o'clock we were able to resume services," Whitehead said.

A burial service that was scheduled for Thursday was postponed until

Friday morning, said Chapel of Hope co-manager Danielle Hammock. Anyone with information concern-
