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Lovington near growth mark

Lovington Municipal Schools may just meet the 1 percent growth needed to receive additional state funding this year.

Superintendent Steve O'Quinn told the school board Monday night that the district is four-five students over the number needed to qualify for 1 percent growth. But the question is if that many students will be in school

"The day is tomorrow," O'Quinn said Tuesday. 'We just have to hope all those students attend school tomorrow."

New Mexico school districts that see 1 percent or more growth in stu- O'Quinn



dent populations see additional state funding from the funding formula. O'Quinn said 1 percent growth would add \$170,000-\$180,000 to the district, enough to offset the remaining portion lost when the state cut all schools' funding by 3.2 percent this

Federal funds allocated to New Mexico in August offset most of the state funding cuts.

In other school news, the district

approved a resolution for an election proclamation — a district board election in February for the seats of Lynda McGinnes, Thurman "Slick" Duncan and Ronny Reeder.

The district will also have a renewal of one of two 2 mill levies. O'Quinn said the mill has to be renewed every four years and adds about \$1 million to the district, which is used for maintenance.

Ride targets motorcycle awareness

Local motorcycle enthusiasts are invited to participate in a ride Oct. 30 to raise awareness of motorcycle

Area resident Sherry Houston is one of the organizers behind the ride and said it is designed to help remind area drivers to watch for motorcyclists.

"There were too many fatalities in Hobbs this year that involved people riding motorcycles," she said. "We want to remind everyone to be safe and to check for motorcycles when they're driving."

The "Can You See Me Now" awareness ride is sponsored by the Old Dogs Brotherhood motorcycle group, but is open to anyone.

Houston said she's hoping motorcycle riders of all ages and affiliations will turn out.

Activities are scheduled to begin at noon Oct. 30 at New Mexico Junior College.

Participating riders will meet at NMJC near the Ray Birmingham Baseball field for food and to social-

From NMJC, Houston said the group will leave at about 2 p.m. and drive south on Grimes to Broadway, east on Broadway to Dal Paso, north on Dal Paso to Bender and west on Bender to Albertsons.

At Albertsons the group will split up and "saturate Hobbs," Houston

"We want to just drive all around to raise awareness," she said.

Police spokesman Officer Mike Stone said the ride is a good idea.

"Any program that brings awareness of motorcycle riders is good for the community," he said.

At the end of the day, riders will regroup at NMJC for refreshments.

Participants are encouraged to order a T-shirt before Oct. 22 to wear on the ride. The shirts are large, 1X and 2X, Houston said. Before Oct. 30, shirts are \$15 and will be \$20 the day of the ride.

All proceeds from the ride will go to help families of the victims of recent motorcycle fatalities. Houston said donations are welcome.

Hobbs attorney dies at home

New Mexico Junior College Board chairman and wellknown Hobbs attorney Larry Hanna, 58, died at his home of natural causes Tuesday morn-

"I think it's a huge loss for the community at large and a tremendous loss to the New Mexico Junior College," NMJC President Steve McCleery said.

Hanna, who served as the

attorney for County Lea for many years and the attorney for the cities of Eunice Jal, and Tatum for several years, was an active community member whose service

was well-known in local government and the arts.

Hanna had been a member of the NMJC board for about nine years, McCleery said. He also served on the Foundation Board for several years helping to fund scholarships for students.

McCleery said Hanna had several years of input into NMJC's future and direction and much of that vision is still ongoing.

"I think that Larry's work is going to be unveiled for many years," McCleery said. "... Our heartfelt sympathies go out to his family.'

At Lea County, commission chairman Greg Fulfer said Hanna was a pillar.

"He's been just the backbone," Fulfer said. "We ran everything through Larry. He's going to be sorely, sorely missed.'

Lasik service coming to Hobbs

State-of-the-art laser eye surgery will be wheeling its way into Hobbs in the coming

Hobbs Ophthalmologist Arnett Carraby has been working in Hobbs since 2007, but prior to that he had performed more than 10,000 refractive eye procedures, a process known as Lasik. Carraby has been here, but the equipment, which runs about \$500,000, has-

"I have been practicing ophthalmology for 25 years and I have been doing refractive sur-

gery since it started in 1999," he said. "We just haven't had the special equipment here, but we are finally going to get that next

The equipment will be trucked to Lea Regional Medical Center by Laser Vision Centers once a month for operations.

"This is a great program for small areas," Carraby said. "They have five places they take this equipment and two certified technicians that work with it."

The program lets smaller hospitals rent the
