Special fare kicks off flights

To celebrate the start of new air service from Hobbs to Houston through United Airlines, a special rate for air service is being offered.

Economic Development Corporation of Lea County began announcing the special fare Thursday and it is already piquing interest.

"So far the reaction has been very good," said David Jett, director of marketing and public relations for the

The special rate is \$198 for a round-

trip ticket, but there are some requirements, Jett

"It has to be a three night stay minimum and must be used by Jan. 6, 2012," Jett said.

The tickets can be bought at United Airlines online or through www.flyhobbs.com.

Hobbs had originally signed a contract with Continental Airlines, but the company merged with United earlier this year.

The merger is good news for Hobbs, Jett said.

"That expands our horizons," he said. "With Continental and United together, it doubles the places you can fly out of Houston. We have the largest air carrier in the world in our back yard."

Flights to or from Houston that do not meet the requirements for the special rate will vary in price depending on a multitude of factors, but should be within \$50 of the

same flight from Midland, Jett said.

The first flight from Hobbs to Houston is scheduled for July 1 and will be celebrated on June 30 when the first plane taxies to the gate, Jett said.

"We are going to have the plane taxi to the gate and pass through some water jets from fire trucks," he said.

Jett said he wants to make sure the community knows that the flights to and from Hobbs will not be made with a prop plane, but with a 50-passenger jet.

Eunice police to be assisted by LCSD

Lea County Sheriff's Department is assisting the Eunice Police Department with managing services until a new police chief is hired.

The City of Eunice decided not to renew the contract of former Chief Kevin Burnam by a vote of 4-3 in early May.

On Tuesday the county commission approved the memorandum of understanding between Lea County and the City of Eunice for the Lea County Sheriff's Office to provide law enforcement supervision for 60 days or until the position is filled.

Lea County's Sheriff's Department Undersheriff Mark Hargrove said they are basically taking over day to day operations.

"Since the chief has been gone they don't have a department head." Hargrove said. "Capt. James Wilmeth will be filling that position."

City of Eunice Mayor Matt White said council members did not renew the former police chief's contract about 30 days ago.

"We had a couple of local officers apply for the chief's position and we didn't feel like it was fair to use them as an acting police chief in the meantime," White said. "So we asked the Sheriff's Department to help us with that.'

Eunice City Council member C.W. Motes said he feels stricter leadership

is needed over other officers.

"I'd like see more turn around here as long as keeping people off the street late at night and things like that," he said. "Making sure our officers are out there more."

Eunice City councilor Billy Hobbs said he feels confident about a new

"I am waiting to do the interviews and just get going from there," he

Mayor White said police officers are still on the job and everything is going on as usual.

"There are no reasons for any of the citizens to be alarmed, everything is normal," White said.

Nor-Lea to ban smoking

Nor-Lea Hospital is joining the growing ranks of hospitals across the country to ban smoking and tobacco products from

The hospital announced this week that beginning July 1 employees and guests would be prohibited from smoking or using other tobacco products at any of the hospital's campuses.

The new policy applies to patients, guests, employees, contractors and vendors — indoors and outdoors, including inside privately-owned vehicles parked on campus.

The move is late in coming, said Nor-Lea Chief Executive Officer David Shaw.

"It is something the board and I spent about three years talking about," he said. "Our hospital is kind of behind the curve on this — 37 of the 42 hospitals in the state have done or are doing

Previously, smoking was only prohibited within 30 feet of hospital buildings.

"It really just comes down to a health issue," Shaw said. "One of the things we think is really important is we want to set an example for the community as far as healthy lifestyles. We need to respect those patients that are here and those staff that don't smoke. There is evidence second-hand smoke can be dangerous.'

The hospital has instituted free help for employees that smoke by offering free smoking cessation counseling and access to other smoking cessation
